

Placing a focus on phonics



By emphasising phonics instruction (a teaching approach that focuses on the relationship between sounds and letters), you can provide the essential skills a child needs to decode words, improve reading fluency, and enhance their overall reading comprehension.



Some techniques to try and include:

- Teaching letter-sound associations
- Practising blending and segmenting sounds
- Using phonics-focused reading materials
- Playing phonics games for sound manipulation

Engaging the senses



Introducing a multi-sensory teaching approach can instantly enhance a child's engagement by catering to their unique needs with interactive and 'hands-on' activities.

Some techniques to try include:

Using visual aids

- Using auditory tools
- Using kinaesthetic activities to make learning more fun and 'active'





Going at their pace



Some children require additional time to process information. This is why patience is key. By giving a child the time and space they need to succeed, you'll provide a supportive environment for their learning journey.



To avoid a child becoming overwhelmed or stressed during reading:

- Be empathetic and understand their frustrations
- Encourage them to ask questions and seek help when needed
- Create a positive and non-judgemental atmosphere

- Engage in activities that boost their self-confidence and self-expression
- Involve them in setting their learning goals and celebrate their progress
- Be flexible and adaptable to their unique learning pace

Creating a distraction-free environment



For children experiencing any learning-based challenges, creating an environment they can focus in is essential.

To create a space that nurtures a child's ability to focus and improve their reading skills, we suggest:

- Minimising distractions during reading activities
- Establishing a quiet and dedicated reading area
- Ensuring proper lighting for comfortable reading conditions
- Removing electronic devices during reading time
- Implementing a structured routine for reading sessions
- Providing ergonomic seating for optimal focus and comfort



Creatively expanding their vocabulary

Allocating time for repeat reading




Sometimes, practice really can make perfect! By embracing the power of repetition, you can significantly improve a child's:

Fostering an enjoyment of learning

To do this:

- Encourage reading for pleasure with book choices they enjoy
- Include fun activities like storytelling, roleplaying, or reading aloud
- Create a cosy reading nook for relaxation
- Minimise emphasis on errors during reading sessions
- Praise efforts and progress to boost confidence



Bonus tip: While general behavioural guidelines can be set during reading time, it's vital not to make this a focus. Children engage better with learning when there's less focus on what they can't do and more on what they can do!

Supporting a child with dyslexia on their journey to reading success requires a multifaceted approach.


